Part 1: The Overall Situation

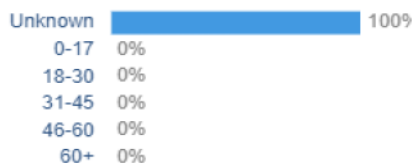
Philippines

In the Philippines, since the global outbreak of Covid 19, the first positive cases was started to be recorded last January 30 with the 1st three cases were citizens from China from Wuhan¹, has currently **3,870** positive cases (*previous report, 2,084*) with **182** deaths (*previous report 88*) report and **96** recovered cases (*previous report 49*).

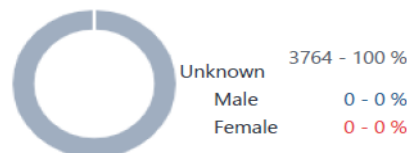

On March 17, 2020 through proclamation no. 929 President Rodrigo Duterte has placed the whole Philippines under state of Calamity due to the Corona virus disease. The proclamation was the recommendation of the department of health and the Inter Agency Task Force (IATF) for emerging infectious diseases as despite government interventions, the number of confirmed cases of Covid19

continues to rise. The purpose of the of the declaration also to be able for local government units be able to access the quick emergency response funds under the Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Act (DRRM Act) of the Philippines.

The declaration supports also the earlier pronounce of the government putting the whole Luzon island under enhanced community quarantine, where all movements of it's the people are highly restricted to prevent further spread of the virus which will be effected until April 13 midnight.

All domestics flights are shutdown already as of the moment while selected international fights are allowed with strict restriction. As most of the country is under different level of quarantine all modes of public transportation are prohibited except if it is transporting essential items to and from quarantined areas.

The spread of Covid 19 in the Philippines has reached also the program areas of our 12 local partners. They were able to provide latest update on their program areas base on their coordination with their respective Partner local government units (LGU). The table² below shows all program areas of our partners that is under Community Quarantine³ and or in Enhanced Community Quarantine⁴ based on the category of quarantines defined by the national government. It also shows the number of Covid cases that are either Positive, Person Under Investigation (PUI)⁵ or Person Under Monitoring (PUM)⁶

In the table shows that 24 program areas of our local partners are under Enhanced Community Quarantine while 8 of the 10 program areas are only under Community Quarantine declaration while two program areas of local partners their LGU have yet to declare either Community Quarantine or Enhanced Community Quarantine.

As of April 8 there are **300** positive cases (*previous report 76*) in the program areas and majority of them are in the Metro Manila program areas (278) or in the National Capital Region. There are **694** individuals that are PUI's (*previous report 694*) while **15,434** (*previous report 20,989 and for further validation from partners*) where recorded that are in the PUM list in scattered in almost all program areas. PUI and PUM list with no positive cases does not mean does not mean that areas are safe of the spread of the virus already but it's because of the limitation of test kits arriving in the provinces where our partners work.

The state of calamity declaration did not mention any request for international assistance. The declaration is effective for six months from its declaration. The government also is starting to roll out its US\$542 million package for Covid 19 response focused on economic and livelihood recovery programs and support to distribution of test kits.

On March 24, the Philippine Congress and Senate granted the Philippine president emergency powers to reallocate existing national budget for projects that would fight the spread of Covid 19. In the \$5 billion emergency funds, some 18 million low-income households would receive assistance.⁷

The national government is starting implementing its two-month Social Amelioration Program (SAP) for the poorest families or families that lost their regular income due to the lock down. Identified families will receive around P5,000-P8,000 (\$98-\$157) per family.

As of April 7, the Inter Agency Task Force (IATF) has announced that the Luzon wide Enhanced Quarantine will be extended until April 30.

For issues children are facing right now with the Covid 19 outbreak throughout the country, based on the Council Welfare of Children (CWC) report are the following;

1. Curfew set by LGU's that penalizes minors heavily which includes imprisonments and mixing them with adults
2. Not all school children/learners able to access alternative delivery modes suggested by the department of educations
3. Food shortages puts at risk most of children as irregular working parents affected by the community quarantines/lockdown does not have income to feed their children.
4. With the home quarantine/lockdown declarations parents/caregivers boredom and idle situation could exacerbate existing child protection issues at home.
5. Access to Medical support to children with special needs during the quarantine/lockdown state.

Part 3: ChildFund's Response

ChildFund CO initially provided guidance on Covid 19 for local partners last March 13 on how they can manage their operation and identify alternative activities they can implement through the development of their respective contingency plans. But within a few days since the initial guidance was provided, the Covid 19 cases in the Philippines has tripled which led the whole Philippines on quarantine/lockdown implementation since last March 15. With this, all contingency plans submitted by local partners are not applicable based on the current situation as most of the partner are still planning to implement group activities.

With the whole country in almost total enhanced community quarantine/lockdown situation and affecting all the low income families to which most of our enrolled families are from, the CO is proposing to implement an overall response plan with all 12 local partner in implementing the following interventions;

Phase 1: Immediate Phase

- A. Home-based activities-** Package of suggested activities that local partners can remotely share in their covered communities which they can disseminate through different modalities depending on life stage and accessibility. These activities will focus on addressing the psychosocial intervention gaps of these emergency which the contents will focus on;
- Child focused activities at home for children and Child Protection messages
 - Parenting guidance for parents/caregivers during Covid19 emergency

- B. Standby funds for medical support-** As the Covid 19 crisis in the Philippines is just in its infancy stage and the peak of the outbreak is not yet experienced and to add the capacity gap of respective LGU's in responding to this emergency, the CO intervention would like to support families in covered communities that will test positive on Covid 19 and are on Persons Under Investigation (PUI) list and needing referral support after government provided its assistance but still not enough to sustain the prescribe medical advice to recover and get healthy again. This intervention aims to target not just enrolled families but also non enrolled families in covered communities.

Phase 2: Recovery

- A. Cash Transfer Programming-** Depending on resources availed, the CO will implement cash transfer (conditional unrestricted) intervention focusing on two modalities; direct cash and voucher distribution depending on local partner assessment and situation.

This intervention aims to alleviate target families severely affected economically by Covid 19 in program covered areas.

With strict government protocols on quarantines/lockdowns, Humanitarian organizations have also limited movements on their intentions to provide intervention to their selected program areas. Majority of humanitarian organizations immediate interventions are focused on spreading information dissemination on verified Covid 19 sources of information's.

The CO is in close coordination with the Philippine International NGO Network (PINGON) on updating and coordination remote meetings in discussions in addressing Covid 19 humanitarian issues in the Philippines.

The CO also participate in the National Child Protection Working Group (NCPWG) on Covid 19 emergencies. The working group are discussing and closely monitoring the effects of the declared guidelines and intervention strategies to Children in general on the national government Covid 19 interventions.

With the Corona virus outbreak, coordination meetings are done virtually to follow and maintain social distancing.

The CO is still finalizing its overall response plan and hopefully will be share to partners the soonest as possible.

The CO has finalized and rollout its partner guidance on their Covid 19 response and partners will realign their remaining subsidy to support the implementation of the response plan.

The CO also has finalize its response proposal and has been submitted to RO and IO for review.

Last April 3, the CO participated in the PINGON virtual meeting which highlighted member participants sharing their respective on-going and planned interventions for Covid 19. Below are the highlights of the sharing;

- The most common intervention that is being done by almost all International NGO's are on risk communication/psychosocial support interventions to families and communities. Some organizations are conducting Alternative Learning Sysytem working with Department of Educations and other distributing hygiene kits

- Most of the organizations have Cash programming interventions in their pipeline of proposals or will soon roll out their cash transfer programming on support to food distribution.
- Of the International NGO's World Vision so far has the biggest investment on this response, they have been providing huge logistical support to gov't Covid 19 facilities but mostly in Metro Manila. They have been distributing Personal Protective Equipment's (PPE) as well to key government Covid 19 facilities.

With this, CO planned interventions is aligned to other humanitarian organizations plan as well. We shared our Home Based/Psychosocial intervention activities that we plan to roll out soon and shared also that we are working on a proposal that includes cash programming interventions

The CO has issued already a local partner guidance in implementing activities for the remainder of the fiscal year align to the CO response plan.

Part 4: Office and Staff Status

All CO and field office staff have been requested by the Country Management Team (CMT) on Work-From-Home (WFH) arrangement. Initially the design for the CO staff was at least 2 days a week work in the office and the rest at home. But with the recent spike of positive cases and enhanced quarantine declaration for Luzon island and increased risks across all the country, the CMT has declared a full WFH arrangement.

Two staff were put into 14 days self-quarantine after showing some symptoms and being exposed with people that tested positive with Covid 19 in network activities so far have passed the 14 day self-quarantine and are now fully healthy again.

There are no staff/partner organization staff completed yet the WHO COVID online training <https://www.who.int/emergencies/diseases/novel-coronavirus-2019/training/online-training>.

Each unit supervisors of the CO have submitted their respective work plans to the Country Management Team for the WFH arrangement.

The Wellness committee of the CO have organized a weekly all staff online events that staff can join related to psychosocial and wellbeing activities. For this week almost all CO staff were able to join the meditation and breathing exercise facilitated by an external resource person.

The Enhanced Community Quarantine (ECQ) in Metro Manila and Luzon Island has been extended to until April 30. With this WFH arrangement will be extended as well. Each unit of the CO will submit another work plans to cover the extended time of the ECQ.

The Wellness committee organized a webinar focused on "**Home Quarantine is No Joke: Fostering Adjustments and Cultivating Creativity in Children at Home**". This was participated by almost all CO staff (GSS staff based in the Philippines), other CO staff (Indonesia) and local partner staff. The webinar was facilitated by professors from University of the Philippines.

Part 6 Safety & Security

With the steady and alarming rise of Covid 19 cases, the National Capital Region and almost the rest of the country already under the stage of Enhanced Community Quarantine/Lockdown and with that many checkpoints are established and are being manned by Police and Military personnel.

Only essential stores and services like groceries, pharmacies, markets, hardware's, food deliveries are allowed to operate to manage and prevent the spread of the virus.

All domestic flights are shutdown already as of the moment while selected international flights are allowed with strict restriction. Donor and international staff visits in the country are currently not recommended.

Only cargoes of basic necessities are allowed as of the moment to be transported to their destination. Innovative and creative local government units have implemented various services to minimize the movement of their citizens and maintain social distancing. One of the unique approach piloted by a city in Metro Manila is the mobile market where citizens need not to go or travel to market to buy food and goods, they just need to go to designated place in their villages as to where the mobile markets (using trucks) are.

As Enhanced Community Quarantine extended in Metro Manila until the end of April, among the additional guidelines is that all designated family member that is allowed to go outside their homes to buy essential items is mandated to wear a face mask all the time. Check points also have been intensified more to ensure that all people going in and out of the communities are closely monitored.

Part 9 Media/Communications

Communications strategy is developed already. CO spokespersons are Country Director Federico Diaz-Albertini and Program Director Isabelle Ereneta supported by Communication Specialist Vevet Lascano.

Communications strategy revolves on this approach;

1. Tapping of national and local radio networks to widen awareness on preventive measures and coping approaches to Covid-19, and inform localities/region of CO’s intervention
2. Optimize use of online platforms such as; Facebook and Instagram for CoVlog-19, MSTeams for Online training on PHPSS
3. Partnering opportunities with private sector like Globe Telecom for use of messaging facility like Amber.
4. CO spokespersons are Country Director Federico Diaz-Albertini and Program Director Isabelle Ereneta supported by Communication Specialist Vevet Lascano.

Communication support to be manifested in the following;

1. Talking points and content flow for radio airtime that will be tapped and used by some of the Local Partners will be developed once the complete package of the intervention during this COVID-19 crisis is concretized and will subsequently be cascaded/oriented to our Local Partners.

2. Create supporting materials for the intervention in the forms of:
 - a. A Letter to Sponsors from Children that includes how they are doing/coping during this crisis. This have been developed to go along the implementation of home-based activities
 - b. A supplementary poster on guidelines How to Protect Self and Others can be attached
 - c. Additional supplementary material (poster) on How to Help Children Cope with Stress During COVID-19
 - d. Develop age-group specific guidelines brochure (from NCTSN)
 - e. Develop a brief PFA Guide to Field Workers (from WHO and World Vision material page 32-36)
 - f. Research and develop material for Children With Disabilities during Covid-19 to be shared to the Local Partners for dissemination.
 - g. Creation and staging of community CoVlog-19
