Part 1: The Overall Situation

As of 09 August 2020, the Government of Indonesia has announced 125,396 confirmed cases of COVID-19 across all provinces, with deaths 5,723 and 80,952 people have recovered from the illness. and over 1.7 million specimens have been tested by using the Real Time Polymerase Chain Reaction Assay and the Molecular Rapid Test for Tuberculosis methods since the beginning of the outbreak. As of 09 August, most confirmed cases were in Jakarta, East Java, West Java and Central Java.

The Government of Indonesia has announced a fund allocation of IDR. 695.2 trillion to mitigate the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, which includes IDR. 203.9 trillion for social assistance. On 19 July, the Minister of National Development Planning and Head of BAPPENAS announced that so far, only 113 districts / cities (22 percent out of 514 districts / cities in Indonesia) had updated their data on recipients of social assistance. As of 8 July, the Direct Cash Assistance of the Village Fund has been received by 74,865 villages (99 percent of the total 74,953 villages throughout Indonesia). A total of 74,753 villages have determined the beneficiary families through village consultation meetings, while 72,599 villages have distributed the assistance.

The Coordinating Ministry for Economic Affairs plans to re-start its pre-employment training program by opening a fourth batch of trainings by the end of July. The plan is set following the enactment, on 7 July, of Presidential Regulation No. 76 of 2020 which revises previous regulations for the implementation of the program. In the three first batches about 680,000 people benefitted from the program (58 percent of them being workers who lost their jobs, 35 percent job seekers, six percent people who were still working, and one percent of MSME entrepreneurs). Of the total, about 143,000 people were proposed through the Ministry of Manpower or the BPJS Labor mechanism. For the next batches, the Ministry of Manpower has collected data from three million people, of which 1.7 million have their data verified by the Provincial Manpower Offices.

To integrate health and economic policies in Indonesia, on 20 July, the President created the COVID-19 Response Committee and the National Economic Recovery (PEN) through Presidential Regulation number 82 of 2020. The President underlined that the health response remains a priority, and urged the Committee to pay special attention to the provinces of DKI Jakarta, West Java, Central Java, East Java, North Sumatra, South Sulawesi, South Kalimantan and Papua, as these eight provinces contribute 74 percent of the confirmed cases in Indonesia.

DKI Jakarta has extended the implementation of Large-Scale Social Restrictions (PSBB) until 13 August, as a transitional effort towards the Adaptation of New Behavior. The transitional PSBB imply a gradual easing of the restrictions to social and economic activities. Communities can return to their activities with the requirement to follow the necessary health protocols. The PSBB is also extended in districts / cities in

West Java (Bogor City, Depok, Bekasi, Bogor Regency and Bekasi) bordering Jakarta until 16 August. Meanwhile, the implementation of the New Behavior Adaptation in other 22 districts / cities of West Java has been extended until 29 August.

The Provincial Government of Bali opened tourism activities for domestic tourists on 31 July, by issuing rules on the conditions for visiting Bali (through Circular Letter number 15243 of 2020). Every tourist visiting Bali must complete an application via the <https://lovebali.baliprov.go.id>, must prove to be free of COVID-19 by showing a certificate of PCR (Polymerase Chain Reaction) negative results, or at least a negative non-reactive rapid results test. The health document must have been issued within the 14 days prior to travel. Bali is also preparing to receive foreign tourists again; the reopening is expected to take place on 11 September 2020.

The Health Cluster, led by the Ministry of Health and facilitated by WHO, conducted its multi-stakeholder coordination meeting on 15 – 17 July, which reviewed and updated the Indonesia COVID-19 Operations Plan. Relevant ministries attended the meeting, including TNI (Indonesian Military) and Police, referral hospitals, state-owned medical companies, the Indonesian Red Cross, WHO, FAO, WFP, OCHA, ILO, UNICEF and IFRC. The last day of the workshop discussed civil-military-police coordination, which is a crucial aspect of the COVID-19 response. A working group consisting of personnel from the Ministry of Health and WHO will work to finalize the Plan. The fifth revision of the National Guidelines for COVID-19 Prevention and Control was also completed on 13 July, with WHO's support. A recent assessment by UNFPA revealed that 28 percent of health centers are not fully functioning as per operational hours, and 84 percent of health centers have experienced a reduction in the number of visits. UNFPA has provided PPE to 412 midwifery clinics in Jakarta and its greater areas, and 1,000 dignity kits for women in need. The health cluster also revise the Mental Health and Psychosocial Support guidelines are underway by the Ministry of Health, with inputs from the Psychosocial Support sub-cluster expected to be received by 7 August.

A **logistics** capacity mapping is underway in 12 provinces (Banten, West Java, Central Java, DIY, East Java, South Sulawesi, South Kalimantan, North Sumatra, West Sumatra, Papua, West Nusa Tenggara and Bali) and expected to be completed during August. The cluster also support for coordination at the regional level will be initiated with the Provinces of South Sulawesi and South Kalimantan. As decided by the Director General of Customs and Excise, the Ministry of Finance no longer provides easing of restrictions for some imported COVID-19 goods. It is thus necessary to disseminate information about customs and excise fees to potential importers.

Food Security and Agriculture: Discussions between the Ministry of Agriculture, the Ministry of State-own Enterprises and other stakeholders to strengthen the national food logistics system have started, both related to food commodities and the infrastructure for agricultural production.

Shelter: The COVID-19 prevention guidelines for shelter development projects in Central Sulawesi are being used as internal guidelines by the Task Force of the Ministry of PUPR in Central Sulawesi and its implementing partners. The compilation of the TAGANA Madya training module on shelters and the preparation of community-based quarantine / isolation facilities has now been completed, and the first training has been conducted for 43 TAGANA Madya personnel along with representatives from the East Java Provincial Social Office.

Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM): As a joint activity, IOM, Muhammadiyah, Human Initiative and BAZNAS have created a CCCM checklist and plan for security in camps in response to

Rohingya refugees in the Aceh Province of Indonesia. CCCM training is being prepared for local governments and local NGOs in Aceh. In addition, work is ongoing on strengthening the capacity of TAGANA per provinces and creating a multi-sectoral e-Learning Platform for TAGANA.

Protection and Management of Gender Based Violence and Women's Empowerment: Partners working in the area of Gender have distributed sanitation, hygiene and basic needs supplies in 34 provinces, supporting women in family food security activities, and strengthened the capacity of the Complaints and Violence Assistance Post for Women.

Nutrition: UNICEF and partners have been supporting the Ministry of Health with data collection of infant formula and other Breast Milk Substitute (BMS) products distribution, which is expected to strengthen the policy on the BMS donation during emergency and its management. The drafting Operational Guidelines for Handling Nutrition in Disaster Situations have been prepared jointly with the Ministry of Health.

Education: A number of schools located in areas within the green zones for COVID-19 (i.e. low risk districts) in Indonesia have now started face-to-face learning. The National Government, through a Joint Decree of the Four Ministers (Minister of Education and Culture, Minister of Religious Affairs, Minister of Home Affairs and Minister of Health) has regulated that schools can carry out face-to-face learning only in green zone areas, with several conditions. UNICEF and partners are providing policy advice to support this process. Back to Learning campaign in the Academic Year 2020/2021 is ongoing. The Ministry of Education and Culture is working on the easing of telecommunications regulations related to community radio broadcast licenses initiated by schools in order to support distance learning.

Early Recovery: UNDP is working with the online media Katadata, National Geographic, and Magdalene to identify the risks and impact of COVID-19, looking into specific themes such as gender violence, the environment, and the rights for communities with disabilities. A series of virtual discussions have been carried out, reaching more than 2,000 participants from all regions of Indonesia. In addition, sectoral guidelines have been issued for enterprises in the context of New Normal. An Executive Round Table Dialogue is planned for 22 July, which will be continued with sectoral discussions: Transportation (29 July), Offices (6 August), Food and Industry (13 August), hotel and tourism (19 August), and grouped activities and sports (27 August).

Community Engagement working groups: Providing support to groups or fora at the provincial level in Central Sulawesi, East Nusa Tenggara and Bali. The working group is also focused on the preparation of the latest edition of the COVID-19 Prevention and Response Guidelines (version 5, KMK HK 01.07 / Kemkes/ 413/2020) understandable to the general public and translated into Sign Language. There are now 262 non-government institutions with over 3,000 activities recorded in the 3W – “who does what where” tool to date. The most active areas include health, reproductive health and WASH, while the geographical areas with the greatest number of activities are in DKI Jakarta, West Java, Central Java, East Nusa Tenggara and Central Sulawesi. As of 30 July, funding for non-governmental multi-stakeholders in support of the COVID-19 response and related impact reached US \$ 156.6 million.

- What issues are children in these areas facing: during this reporting period, most school are doing home learning. The government do measuring if the school can open for study which it depend on the situation and anticipating by developing guideline if student need to continue home learning.

Part 3: ChildFund’s Response

3.a. Overall

Responding to the current situation where Covid19 cases increases and Jakarta the Capital City regulated to extend its transitional covid19 mobility restriction by 14 days until 13 August 2020, where at same time ChildFund Indonesia Office introducing the 4-10 approach when we return to the office. ChildFund identifying the staff into 2 groups, if staff find their job can be done from home, should be done from home.

ChildFund Indonesia accomplish distributing Cash Assistance to 1,500 family in period of 10-17 July 2020 in Urban Jakarta where 2 partners located. The project funded by ChildFund Korea. The post distribution assessment conducted to the beneficiaries during the period of 27 July to 8 August 2020.

Another Cash Assistance program funded by subsidy funds and new funds from IO will reach to 2,300 family at 5 partners in 5 provinces. Currently the partner doing registration of beneficiaries and collecting some of the require document.

3.b. Program Response

The partners currently have been doing work of their program integrating with Covid19 in the more regular activities. The parenting program added covid19 as one of the topics to discuss on radio broadcasting or have a small family group supporting by facilitators.

Covid19 response in the field by 15 ChildFund’s partners has reached 304,150 Household (1,188,636 people in 168 villages of 29 districts in 8 provinces:

- 27,627 KIE (Information Education and Communication of leaflets, posters, banners, and billboards) materials distributed to family, community and health institution at the village, sub-district and district level
- Distributed 14 container boxes
- Distributed 20 units, Loud Speaker
- Installed 355 handwashing station
- Distributed 124 buckets
- Distributed 2,736 soap
- Distributed 14 pack detergent
- Distributed 82 pack tissue

- i. Sprayed of disinfectant to 188 locations
- j. Distributed 1,157 bottles of disinfectant liquid
- k. Distributed 163 bottles of hand sanitizer
- l. Distributed 19,236 face mask
- m. 86 times training how to make disinfectant
- n. Distributed 132 Personal Protection Equipment for the medical team
- o. Distributed 114 aprons full disposable
- p. Distributed gloves 1,608 set
- q. Distributed 52 boots

During the period of May to June 2020, below is the summary of partners intervention during the pandemic:

- 4,941 children received support in house vegetable planting for food security program
- 504 youth received support to develop catfish in house farming
- 4,407 children and youth received integrated education program during covid19
- 796 children and parents received educational materials related to hand washing stations for the community in every home
- 1,537 adult took part in an interactive dialogue to optimize distance learning during covid19 pandemic
- 3,159 parents of toddlers and children age 6-14 attended parenting online classes.
- 75 community base child protection team in villages/ sub districts are actively involved in prevention and responses to covid19.
- 244 youth received full information related to covid19 prevention
- 100 people participated on healthy snack contest
- 8 mosque youth group produced face shield.

There are another achievement related to covid19 for July as follow:

- 5,903 people from 1,500 family received cash assistance
- 7,820 child and adult received mask
- 4,000 flyer related to covid19 information distributed to 2,000 families
- 12 banners installed at 4 villages at location where cash assistance program implemented
- 10 hand washing station installed at location where cash assistance program implemented

ChildFund Indonesia will remain to collaborate with existing partners as the Covid19 also affected community in all areas of ChildFund's partners.

3.b.1. Stop COVID-19 from infecting children and families

ChildFund’s Global Response Plan
 To help children and families protect themselves from COVID-19, we are installing community, handwashing stands; educating communities about symptoms, hygiene measures and where to get tested or treatment; and distributing soap, hand sanitizer, gloves and masks to families and frontline, health workers. For children who are being treated for COVID-19 or are subject to quarantine measures, we are creating child-friendly spaces with age-appropriate toys and reading matter.

The covid 19 project continue supporting by CF Korea. Hand over of 10 hand washing stations at 2 villages, distribution of face mask for 7,820 people and 4,000 flyer distributed.

3.b.2. Ensure that children get food they need

ChildFund’s Global Response Plan
 To ensure that the most vulnerable families can keep food on the table, pay rent and cover other basic needs, we are providing cash for those families most needing this support, such as those who have lost their income because of COVID-19, child or elder-headed households, and/or households affected by disability or chronic illness. Where possible, we are distributing food and basic household items directly, carefully abiding by COVID-19 protection measures

3.b.2. 1. Cash Transfers and vouchers

- Distribution of funds been conducted to 1,500 family who impacted by pandemic covid19. Distribution held 10-17 July 2020.
- Another 5 partners will do Cash assistance Program using existing subsidy and addition subsidy funds from International Office and Non-Sponsorship Program Funds.

3.b.2.2. Other responses in relation to objective 3.b.2.

- When Partners identified family under the observation of Covid19, therefore food support provided to the family as they quarantine and not possible to do work and earn money. This happened to enroll the family under the observation of Covid19 at South Sumatera.

3.b.3. Keep children safe from Violence: physically and emotionally

ChildFund’s Global Response Plan

We are supporting community-based child protection systems that identify, respond to and refer cases of abuse, neglect, violence or exploitation. We are also providing virtual, online psychological first aid and counseling, and supporting temporary shelters for children who live on the street, providing hygiene supplies, food and other basics. We are also arranging safe and appropriate care for children who are separated from their caregivers due to treatment or prevention measures.

ChildFund Indonesia along with IJF members (ChildFund, Save the Children, Plan, Wahana Visi, Plan, SOS, on 09 July 2020, conducted child consultation with Indonesia Commission of Child Protection (KPAI).

ChildFund Indonesia begin 2nd online survey targeted parents who have a children 0-18 years old. Several aspect will study and the tools being develop. The survey begin 3 August for 3 weeks.

3.b.4. Help children continue to do their job: Learning

ChildFund’s Global Response Plan

While schools remain closed, we are supporting children’s learning through activities and tutoring sessions online or by radio. For students without reliable internet access, we are distributing home learning kits with materials and guides for their use.

3.b.5. Other responses

ChildFund provided guidelines for parents on how to manage the situation during covid19 hence the children will do a happy home learning session.
