Part 1: The Overall Situation

As of 10 Oct 2020, the Government of Indonesia has announced 328,952 confirmed cases of COVID-19 across all provinces, with deaths 11,765 and 251,481 people have recovered from the illness. and over 3.7 million specimens have been tested by using the Real Time Polymerase Chain Reaction Assay and the Molecular Rapid Test for Tuberculosis methods since the beginning of the outbreak. As of 10 Oct, most confirmed cases were in Jakarta, East Java, West Java, Central Java and South Sulawesi.

Jakarta Governor has once again relaxed large-scale social restrictions (PSBB) in the capital, starting another transitional phase on Monday 11 Oct 2020 for two weeks despite the more than 1,000 new COVID-19 cases confirmed daily. The governor said the decision was made based on the number of daily new cases, the daily mortality rate and the trend of total active cases that has flattened during the past few weeks, as well as the increased hospital capacity for COVID-19 patients.

Between Aug. 29 and Sept. 11, Jakarta recorded 14,155 new positive cases or a 37.09 percent increase from the previous two-week period. From Sept. 11 to 25, it recorded 16,606 new positive cases or a 31.74 percent increase, while between Sept. 25 and Oct. 9, it recorded 15,437 new infections or a 22.39 percent increase. During the transitional period, workplaces in 11 essential industries including health, food, energy, communications, finance, logistics and daily needs retail will be allowed to operate at full capacity, while non-essential businesses may allow up to 50 percent of their employees to work at the office.

Referring the situation of Jakarta where ChildFund Country Office located, the task force will held virtual meeting and come with recommendation for further arrangement of the office operations. In the meanwhile, during the large scale restriction, ChildFund Office allow up to 25% essential staff come to office due to work need to do from office such sponsorship work and finance.

The Minister of Health has recently reported that 16,286 medical interns and volunteers have been mobilized to COVID-19 referral hospitals and laboratories across the country; an additional 3,500 interns, 800 health workers and 685 volunteers such as lung specialists, anesthetists, internists, general practitioners and nurses have been identified and will be deployed when needed.

On 14 September, the President of the Republic of Indonesia requested the Coordinating Minister for Maritime Affairs and Investment, Mr. Luhut B. Panjaitan, and the Head of BNPB, Mr. Doni Monardo, to suppress the COVID-19 spread of cases, especially in the nine provinces with the highest number of cases, namely: DKI Jakarta, East Java, Central Java, West Java, Sulawesi South, North Sumatra, South Kalimantan, Bali and Papua. In the short term, three goals must be achieved, as follows: decreased number of daily cases, increase in the recovery rate and a decrease in the mortality rate.

The Ministry of Finance has confirmed the country's economic recession as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. Economic growth in the first quarter of 2020 has been recorded at 2.97 percent, whereas in the second quarter it has declined to minus 5.32 percent; this decline has continued in the third quarter, with an estimated economic shrinkage of 2.9 to 1.0 percent. Overall 2020, the estimated economic shrinkage is at 1.7% to 0.6% as of September 2020.

On 26 September, the President announced the achievements of the social protection programs, as follows:

- Family Hopeful Program has disbursed IDR 29.14 trillion to 10 million beneficiaries.
- Food Aid Program has disbursed IDR 30.98 trillion to 19.41 million beneficiaries.
- Food Aid Program for Jakarta and its greater areas has disbursed IDR 4.41 trillion to 1.9 million beneficiaries.
- Cash Assistance Program for outside Jakarta and its greater areas has disbursed IDR 24.79 trillion to 9.18 million beneficiaries.
- Pre-employment Card Program has disbursed IDR 16.62 trillion to 4.86 million beneficiaries.
- Direct Cash Assistance of the Village Fund Program has disbursed IDR 11.73 trillion to 7.55 million beneficiaries.
- Productive and Working Capital Program of the President Assistance has disbursed IDR 14.18 trillion to 5.9 million beneficiaries.
- Salary Subsidy Program has disbursed IDR 10,8 trillion to 9 million beneficiaries.
- Electricity Discount Program has disbursed IDR 3,46 trillion to 31.4 million beneficiaries.

Furthermore, the Ministry of Finance announced that around 90 percent of poor households in Indonesia have received Government assistance to mitigate the impact of the COVID-19 crisis. Meanwhile, assistance to Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises has reached 22.6 trillion.

The campaign period for this year's regional elections for 270 provinces, districts and municipalities will take place from 26 September to 5 December, with election day set for 9 December 2020. The vote for the different levels of government will be simultaneous on that date. The General Election Commission (KPU – Komisi Pemilihan Umum), through KPU Regulation Number 13 of 2020, has banned several campaign activities that have the potential to gather large crowds: general meetings, harvest ceremonies, and/or music concerts, cultural activities and performances, sports activities including walking and/or cycling, competitions, social activities in the form of bazaars and/or blood donations, and anniversaries of a political party. The Commission only allows specific campaign activities, including limited meetings, face-to-face meetings and dialogues, public debates or open debates between pairs of candidates, distribution of campaign materials, and advertisements. Participation in face-to-face meetings is limited to a maximum of 50 people, with adherence to health protocols, such as maintaining a minimum distance of one meter and wearing masks.

Below are the main highlights of the National Clusters:

Health:

- The Ministry of Health and health partners discussed the revised operational response plan for COVID-19 on 10- 11 September, where recommendations from the Intra-Action Assessments for each pillar were presented and discussed to become priority activities in the revised national and provincial response plans.

- The National Institute for Health Research and Development and WHO discussed solutions to shorten laboratory testing times and increase testing capacity, and agreed that a switch from manual to automatic extraction would help laboratories achieve a target of less than 48 hours.
- The Ministry of Health, with technical support from WHO, has developed six video tutorials on waste management for health care facilities (HCF). The video contains information on solid and liquid waste management in HCF, standard operating procedures, and implementation of water hygiene and sanitation.
- UNDP and WHO provide incinerators and autoclaves worth US \$ 900,000, which will be distributed to six provinces (Bali, Central Java, East Java, Jakarta, West Sumatra and Yogyakarta).
- PCR testing training modules for laboratory technicians are being discussed by the National Institution for Health Research and Development (NIHRD), the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the US Association of Public Health Laboratories, and the Health Human Resources Development Agency with WHO facilitation.
- The Ministry of Health and WHO conducted rapid response team training in 34 provinces from 15 - 24 September. The training covers topics such as surveillance, public health indicators, field investigations, contact tracing, sentinel influenza like illness (ILI) / severe acute respiratory infection (SARI) surveillance, laboratory diagnostics, infection prevention and control, reporting and recording. At the training, provinces share lessons learned, best practices, gaps and challenges encountered during field investigations.

Logistics:

- The commercial supply chain, in collaboration with the Coordinating Ministry for Human Development and Culture, had established the Definition, List and Priorities of Commercial Important Goods during the COVID-19 Pandemic. The agreed important items for supply chain mapping are: orange fruits, eggs, and hand sanitizers. A webinar was held on 23-25 September to present the results of the mapping and 11 focused group discussions regarding the three commodities. The webinar was attended by 230 people including officials from the Ministry of Health, the Trade Offices, and other sub-national agencies, as well as business associations.
- The National Logistics Cluster is mapping the temperature-controlled storage capacity of members of the Indonesian Cold Chain Association (ARPI).

WASH:

- The WASH sub-cluster has conducted five training series of School Reopening webinars, between 22 September and 20 October, for NGOs to assist the Government's efforts to accelerate the reopening of schools in yellow and green zones. The participating NGOs are expected to carry out consistent WASH advocacy to local governments.
- 3M surveys (wearing masks, maintaining a safe distance, and washing hands frequently) are being carried out in eight priority provinces of Indonesia from 24 September to 24 November. To conduct the survey, 400 volunteers from the Volunteers Coordination Team for COVID-19 were trained on 21-23 September.

Risk Communication and Community Engagement:

- The RCCE WG is involving the Indonesian Community Radio Network (JKRI) in the 'Wednesday Talkshow' every Wednesday at 16.00-17.00 with themes related to COVID-19, which reaches more than 400 community radios in 17 provinces. The event is also broadcasted via the FB Fanpage "JKRI" and is available as a podcast.

Part 3: ChildFund's Response

3.a. Overall

Responding to the current situation in Jakarta where ChildFund Country Office located, the task force held virtual meeting and come with recommendation to close the office start from 14 Sept 2020 and begin partially open for maximum 25% of staff allow to come to office since 1 Oct 2020. All things can do from home should do from home.

ChildFund Indonesia accomplish distributing Cash Assistance to 2,394 family on Sept 2020 in addition to 1,500 family in first batch (July 2020).

The total cash for the 1st batch: US\$ 75,000 funded by CF Korea while for the total cash for the 2nd batch: US\$ 52,000. funded by subsidy funds and new funds from IO.

Due to covid19 remain affected in most of ChildFund working area, lesser face to face activities conducted in field. The new cases found in the village of Kupang (NTT Province) where ChildFund's partners presence, the partners suspend the activity in the village and did not visit the village in order to anticipate infected by covid19. Parenting program was held in several group in order to reduce number of participants gather at same place. Youth activities was conducted using covid19 protocol, younger group activities also conducted and continue explaining about covid19 the risk and how to mitigate the infection of covid19.

Personal hygiene promotion conducted in the very beginning of activities. Some of adjustment made by partners to help the activity of youth group in order to help their life skill and capacity especially on farming skill.

3.b. Program Response

In order to address the exchange experiences of youth program within the partners, ChildFund Indonesia conduct series webinar (5 times) with different topic: Inspirative story of youth and class inspiration. Series webinar from 24 Sept to 22 Oct 2020.

Discussion been made with Habitat For Humanity Indonesia for potential collaboration of program in development context and emergency. Sharing the program and mapping the areas was discussed and further discuss for small collaboration in the area where both of us presence.

ChildFund Indonesia conducted online research on COMMUNITY VOICES: Risk and Resilience in the Family During COVID-19. The online data collection conducted 1-31 August 2020 which targeted respondent are parents who have children 0-18 years old. There are 1,164 parents from 25 provinces responded to the survey. 50.7% of respondents are in urban areas, 34.2% in sub-urban areas, and 15.1% in rural areas. ChildFund Indonesia will remain to collaborate with existing partners as the Covid19 also affected community in all areas of ChildFund's partners.

3.b.1. Stop COVID-19 from infecting children and families

ChildFund's Global Response Plan

To help children and families protect themselves from COVID-19, we are installing community, handwashing stands; educating communities about symptoms, hygiene measures and where to get tested or treatment; and distributing soap, hand sanitizer, gloves and masks to families and frontline, health workers. For children who are being treated for COVID-19 or are subject to quarantine measures, we are creating child-friendly spaces with age-appropriate toys and reading matter.

3.b.2. Ensure that children get food they need

ChildFund's Global Response Plan

To ensure that the most vulnerable families can keep food on the table, pay rent and cover other basic needs, we are providing cash for those families most needing this support, such as those who have lost their income because of COVID-19, child or elder-headed households, and/or households affected by disability or chronic illness. Where possible, we are distributing food and basic household items directly, carefully abiding by COVID-19 protection measures

3.b.2. 1. Cash Transfers and vouchers

- The covid 19 project continue supporting by CF Korea and further post distribution assessment conducted to all beneficiaries. 1,500 family reached by the project in 2 partners.
- With the recent (2nd batch of cash transfer), ChildFund Indonesia also will conduct post distribution assessment to beneficiaries. 2394 family reach by the project in 5 partners.

3.b.2.2. Other responses in relation to objective 3.b.2.

- When Partners identified family under the observation of Covid19, therefore food support provided to the family as they quarantine and not possible to do work and earn money. This happened to enroll the family under the observation of Covid19 at South Sumatera.

3.b.3. Keep children safe from Violence: physically and emotionally

ChildFund’s Global Response Plan

We are supporting community-based child protection systems that identify, respond to and refer cases of abuse, neglect, violence or exploitation. We are also providing virtual, online psychological first aid and counseling, and supporting temporary shelters for children who live on the street, providing hygiene supplies, food and other basics. We are also arranging safe and appropriate care for children who are separated from their caregivers due to treatment or prevention measures.

ChildFund Indonesia along with IJF members (ChildFund, Save the Children, Plan, Wahana Visi, Plan, SOS, on 09 July 2020, conducted child consultation with Indonesia Commission of Child Protection (KPAI).

3.b.4. Help children continue to do their job: Learning

ChildFund’s Global Response Plan

While schools remain closed, we are supporting children’s learning through activities and tutoring sessions online or by radio. For students without reliable internet access, we are distributing home learning kits with materials and guides for their use.

3.b.5. Other responses

ChildFund provided guidelines for parents on how to manage the situation during covid19 hence the children will do a happy home learning session.
