### **Country Quarantine Situation**

The Philippines was first placed under the State of Calamity on March 17, 2020 in accordance to **Presidential Proclamation No. 929** for a tentative of six months due to the Covid-19 pandemic. The proclamation was issued after the Department of Health (DOH) and Inter-Agency Task Force for Emerging Infectious Diseases (IATF) raised the Code Alert System for COVID-19 to Code Red Level Two (2). Since then, different lockdown measures were imposed in different areas in the Philippines depending on the risks levels of the areas to Covid-19.

Today, June 30<sup>th</sup> marks its 106<sup>th</sup> day. The current lockdown measures expire and to be replaced with a new quarantine protocol applicable to each area nationwide.

### **Inter-Agency Task Force (IATF) Resolution No. 48**

The IATF on Tuesday 29 June has approved the "recalibration" of the parameters for risk classification of provinces, highly urbanized cities and independent component cities effective July 01. Under the IATF Resolution No. 48, there will only be four levels of community quarantine: the strictest enhanced community quarantine (ECQ), modified ECQ (MECQ), general community quarantine (GCQ), and the most relaxed modified GCQ (MGCQ). The classification of "new normal," which means there are no travel and business restrictions as long as minimum health standards are observed, has been removed under the new directive.

**Levels of 'quarantine the Philippines had undertaken since to date March 17, 2020:**

1	Enhanced Community Quarantine (ECQ)	Under the <b>ECQ</b> , there's no movement regardless of age and health status, minimal economic activity (i.e., food, power, water, etc.) and critical economic sector; no transportation activity except for utility services; suspension of physical classes Under ECQ, only essential services like health care, agriculture, food distribution, export-oriented business and business process outsourcing may operate.
2	Modified Enhanced Community Quarantine (MECQ)	Under the <b>MECQ</b> (containment area) everyone is required to stay at home except for those who are allowed to go to work and to buy essential goods and services. Unessential public gatherings are still prohibited. Resumption of operations of selected manufacturing and processing plants up to a maximum of 50 percent workforce. No public transportation is allowed under the MECQ.; Suspension of physical classes.
3	General Community Quarantine (GCQ)	Under <b>GCQ (buffer zones areas)</b> Limited movement of services and work within the buffer zone and outside the buffer zone; Resumption of operations of government offices and industries up to a maximum of 75 percent of the workforce. some non-essential industries and modes of public transportation may operate, but public gatherings remain restricted; Flexible learning arrangements; schools to operate at limited capacities to cater to students
4	Modified General Community Quarantine (MGCQ)	<b>Under the MGCQ</b> , (outside buffer zones - <b>most lenient</b> ) virtually all sectors are allowed and all modes of public transport can partially operate. Public gatherings are also permitted, but no more than half of the venue may be filled. Areas under MGCQ will have permissive socio-economic activities with minimum public health standards.
	New Normal	Classification of " <b>new normal</b> ," which means there are no travel and business restrictions as long as minimum health standards are observed, has been <b>removed under Resolution No. 8</b> .

**Starting July 1**, the rest of the country will be placed under modified GCQ (**MGCQ**) – the most relaxed quarantine phase where public transportation may resume at full capacity operations, dine-in restaurants, cinemas, and gyms may reopen at half capacity, and public gatherings are permitted with limitations, except for the following:

Still under **GCQ** are: Metro Manila, Benguet, Cavite, Rizal, Leyte, Ormoc, Southern Leyte, Mandaue City, Cebu, Lapu-Lapu City, Cebu, Talisay City, Cebu; Minglanilla, Cebu; Consolacion, Cebu

Still under enhanced community quarantine (**ECQ**) is Cebu City

## Education Continuity

- **Department of Education Basic Education Learning Continuity Plan (BE-LCP)**

In response to the challenges posed by the pandemic, the Department of Education (DepEd) came up with the **“Basic Education Learning Continuity Plan in the time of COVID-19”**. It is a package of education interventions that will respond to basic education challenges brought about by COVID-19. It provides clear guidance to all offices, units, schools, and community learning centers (CLCs) of the Department of Education (DepEd). The Basic Education Learning Continuity Plan (BE-LCP) is also aligned with the Department of Health’s (DOH) minimum health and safety guidelines for COVID-19. The four key areas include increasing physical and mental resilience of both teachers and learners, reducing transmission, reducing contact, and reducing the duration of infection along with other strategies. <https://www.DOH.Gov.Ph/Press-Release/Deped-Aligns-Education-Continuity-Plan-With-DOH-Health-Standards>

BE-LCP is the result of consultations with partners and advisers, legislators, executives and directors, teachers, parents, learners, and the general public. All these contributions were integrated and harmonized by the Executive Committee and Management Committee. BE-LCP covers the essential requirements of education in the time of COVID-19, e.g. most essential learning competencies, multiple learning modalities for teachers, school leaders and learners, required health standards in schools and workplaces, and special activities like Brigada Eskwela, Oplan Balik Eskwela, and partnerships. - **Department of Education (DepEd) Order No. 12, s. 2020, June 19, 2020,**  
*“Adoption of the Basic Education Learning Continuity Plan for School Year 2020-2021 in Light of the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency.”*

The Department of Education presented its BE-LCP to the Inter-Agency Task Force on Emerging Infectious Diseases (IATF) last May 11, 2020. The IATF approved the BE-LCP, as well as the proposal to “open” schools on August 24, 2020.

All efforts and initiatives to implement the BE-LCP will greatly depend on family and community support. It is recognized that there’s a need to prepare not only the schools, learners, administrators, and teaching and non-teaching personnel, but also the parents or guardians of the learners. There will be orientations and capacity building for parents and guardians to prepare them for the new role/responsibilities that they will do. DepEd will need the support and partnership of the LGUs to maximize and align their Special Education Fund in providing resources and assistance for the LCP. ## Part 2: The Situation in Areas Where Educo/ChildFund Works

### Bicol Region

As of June 30, the Department of Health Center for Health Development (DOH CHD) – Bicol reports four **(4) new confirmed cases** of COVID-19 and **one (1) death**. The total number of COVID-19 confirmed cases recorded in Bicol Region is now one hundred fourteen (114). Active cases are thirty (30).

Among the 6 provinces of Bicol, Albay recorded 3 COVID-19 deaths, and one each in Sorsogon, Camarines Sur, and Camarines Norte.

### Province of Albay (Manito and Legaspi)

As of June 11, among Bicol's 6 provinces, Albay has the most cases with 61, followed by Camarines Sur with 13, Camarines Norte with 4, and Sorsogon and Catanduanes with 1 each. Masbate remains free from cases.

To help farmers' livelihood, Albay Governor Al Francis C. Bichara headed the ceremonial turn-over of garden packages to the heads and representatives of the four (4) Schools Division in the province of Albay – Legazpi City, Ligao City, Tabaco City and Albay. This is to further mobilize the "Gulayan sa Paaralan Program hanggang sa Tahanan" and Albay Family-Based Program started-off by Governor Bichara through the Albay Provincial Agricultural Office. - Lack of personnel
- Strength – cooperation of different agency (DepEd, MDRRMO) they can carry out the national mandate with regards to COVID19.
- Procedure for quarantine - 7 days quarantine then on the 7<sup>th</sup> day – RTK for symptomatic and from hotspot
- Last RTK – 4 Positive in IGG and IGM
- Possible problem for long term use of quarantine facility once DepEd will be using the schools
- Quarantine facility is more preferred for easy monitoring and logistics and also to ensure safety of the community
- For LSI and ROF – will be evaluated before home quarantine even though there is medical certificate
- LSI from Hotspot and ROF will be quarantine in the facility for 7 days specially for those people with small house.
- MLGU will identify fix area for long term use and to be accredited by DOH. Once accredited, persons under quarantine can reimburse from Philhealth for their medical expenses.
- As of June 9, the quarantine area are Putiao and Marifosque areas. LGU is planning to open Danlog for those arriving from Manila.
- Moreover, in the coming days they need to identify new area given the DepEd already issued an advice for the LGU to vacate the schools by July 24, 2020.
- They plan to use evacuation centers of Banuyo, Binanuahan and Sapa, and the new building of RHU once finished

#### **Castilla**

- 400 Locally Stranded Individuals (LSIs) to arrive in Castilla on July 2020 from Manila. They will undergo 14 days home quarantine.

### **EDUCATION (LGU/Barangay/School)**

#### **Castilla**

- LGU to provide fund for reproduction of learning materials and developed kits of DepEd in support for the upcoming opening of classes (whatever modality).
- LGU supported the brigade eskwela of DepEd in Castilla: cleaning the surrounding of the school and disinfecting the classrooms through the MDRRMO staff of LGU.
- On-going online enrollment
- On-going preparation of Plans for SY 2020-2021. School Head/Principal
- On-going preparation of instructional materials (worksheets, activities, modules etc.) Since DepEd needed 9million budget for the reproduction of most essential learning competencies (MELC). Due to lack of budget, teachers are advised to prepare their own instructional materials.

### **LIVELIHOOD AND FOOD SECURITY**

#### Castilla:

- Qualified farmers in 34 barangays of Castilla received 5,000 from MAO (not SAP and 4Ps bene)
- Qualified farmers received seeds and fertilizers from DA
- In Barangay Burabod, they'll setting up vegetables and fish store to be managed by women; and men will sell the vegetables and fish.
- LGU Castilla to distribute 30 small boats to indigent fisherfolks in the coastal brgys in Castilla Castilla implemented a project entitled **Serbisyong may pagkamoot**. Brgy to choose 2 indigent families and LGU will provide 15 thousand pesos support in terms of: Livelihood, Food and Groceries, and rehabilitation of house. This project is currently being implemented in the 34 barangays of Castilla.

#### Pilar:

- Qualified farmers received tools and fertilizers from Municipal Agriculture Office

### CHILDREN Protection/ Participation (LGU/Barangay-/School)

PNP Castilla is conducting visitation, dialogue and lecture to Barangay official and tanod on Gender Awareness, crime prevention, implementation of MGCQ and E.O 70 to 34 barangays of Castilla.

- On June 17, Peace and Order in the Municipality of Castilla conducted meeting it was presented that crime rates during quarantine period decreased up to 70%.
- Children are involved in the RCCE activities.
- In barangay Burabod, BCPC coordinated to parents to set quarterly meeting of BCO however parents refused to allow their children to participate for the meantime.

### Others (LGU/BARANGAY/SCHOOL)

#### Castilla

- Municipal Advisory Committee and Municipal Inter-Agency Committee Response convened on June 23 to discuss the KALAHI CIDSS-NCDDP COVID19 response operation manual wherein all the infrastructure projects to 34 barangays in Castilla was realigned to COVID19 initiatives of Barangays such as buying of PPE's and others, but this will be done through project proposal to be submitted to KALAHI Team in the LGU. The total allocated budget for LGU Castilla for the COVID response is 18, 516.050.02 pesos
- LGU Castilla provided Facemasks, vitamins, grocery packs to all BNCs and barangays and Agriculture and Fisheries workers in 34 barangays of Castilla
- Barangay Burabod conducted meeting to PWD and plan out to utilize the fund for the Handog Pamasko Program (supposedly for Dec) to purchased groceries for PWD.

### Municipality of Caramoran, Province of Catanduanes

#### Health (LGU/Barangay/School)

The province continue to observe the quarantine measures of social distancing and hygiene practices. No new cases of COVID-19 is reported in the past 2 weeks. The LGU continually adapts the IATF recommendations and advocacy on the danger of COVID- 19 to the barangays.

### **Education (LGU/Barangay/School)**

The DepEd- Caramoran is set to August 24, 2020 resumption of classes upon approval of the national authorities. During the month, some schools conducted their virtual graduation but discontinued after the suicide incident in Albay.

Online enrollment is on going in schools in Caramoran. The teachers are facilitating this enrollment online. No face to face contact with the pupils. The school distributes a form to the pupils then the teachers collect the filled up form for encoding online. Teachers are also advised to work from home scheme but sometimes there are on call conferences in school called by their school respective heads.

### **Livelihood And Food Security**

In relation to COVID 19 Response initiatives, the municipality of Caramoran distributed relief goods and facemasks to the 27 barangays. Some school had distributed relief goods to their pupils and families.

### **Children Protection/ Participation (LGU/Barangay-/School)**

Punong Barangays are tasked to designate barangay Isolation area in their APOR. There's continuing observance of the curfew hours. Check points are no longer existing in the barangay but it is visible and in operation in the National Highway.

Children Participation in the community is not feasible due to IATF restriction and no recorded child abuse case as of this date.

### **Others (LGU/BARANGAY/SCHOOL)**

There are 87 persons that are under Monitoring as per record today in the RHU and one of this is to undergo repeat test because the person is an OFW. The 87 PUMs are quarantined in the designated areas in their respected barangays in the municipality of Caramoran. No details in figures given.

**Health (LGU/Barangay/School)**

Universidad de Zamboanga donated 5 swabbing booths in support of COVID-19 response. These facilities will help medical front liners to safely take COVID-19 swab samples and consequently help in their goal to ramp up testing. The use of the booths to take specimen will lessen the exposure of healthcare workers to droplets from people infected with the virus. Barangay Health Center continue to become operational for emergency situation BLGU vehicle is available to bring patient to the nearest hospital.

Some 500 Barangay Health Emergency Response Team (BHERT) members from the city's 98 barangays underwent the reorientation for emerging and re-emerging epidemics/ infectious diseases (COVID-19) spearheaded by the CDRMO June 1-3 at the WMSU campus. This is the City Government's way to empowers the barangays to address COVID-19 issues and concerns in the new normal system

**Education (LGU/Barangay/School)**

DEPED National uploaded online learning platform the DEPED Commons and households with access to android phones are using the online platforms to help their children to catch up with lessons.

As to the enrollment, class adviser are task to consult all parents if they are going to enroll their children in this coming school year, The most feasible strategy in Zamboanga City is the use of module (modular learning) but this also becomes a challenge for IPs families or those parents who cannot read and write, how they can teach their children using the modules. For the Brigada Eskwela the schools just had meeting using zoom. DepEd Zamboanga started accepting online enrollment this month of June.

LCE convened the Local School Board (LSB) to explore ways how the local government can support the education sector amidst the COVID-19 pandemic. DEPED proposes the blended learning under the new normal system where City Schools Superintendent Dr. Roy Tuballa discussed the blended learning modalities and other DEPED policies for the forthcoming school year. The mayor committed funds from the Special Education Fund (SEF) for the preparation of learning materials under the DEPED's blended learning modules

For Educo SBESP project, the learners are continuing their online sessions with IMs.

**Livelihood and Food Security**

At the LGU level it remains the same food packs (25 kilos of rice, vegetables and can goods) and water and light subsidy amounting to PHP1,000.00 that the LGU pays directly to the concessionaire. Some organization like One Muslim Christian Lumad continuously conduct outreach missions in far flung

barangays providing relief goods include rice, fresh fish, dried fish among others. The second wave of relief assistance of the City Government were continuing to 98 Barangays.

There is also a continuing implementation of the Kadiwa on Wheels and DTI Rolling stores going to different barangays selling vegetables, fish, fruits and other goods at very low prices.

Families continue to manage their day by day activities like fishing in times they are not allowed to go to market to sell their catch or sell their products, they find ways in selling them through paglalako within communities. Planting materials were prepared by personnel of the Animal Production Division of the Office of the City Veterinarian (OCVET) as work from home during the community quarantine. This were distributed to the families who want planting materials.

**Children Protection/ Participation (LGU/Barangay-/School)**

With the implementation of GCQ, some children started playing outside their homes. Children still enjoy the neighborhood play, playing with their friend within the community

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**Others (LGU/BARANGAY/SCHOOL)**

Continue implementation of EO BC 567-2020-An Act Declaring GCQ in Zamboanga City and providing guidelines for its implementation until May 30, 2020. Strictly implementing the guidelines and apprehend those violators

All local transportation are operational but limited capacity. And LGUs are continuing its assistance to returning OFWs and LSIs.

**National Status**

**Epidemiology**

As of 30 June, the Philippines recorded a total of 37,514 confirmed COVID-19 cases and 1,266 deaths. According to DOH, the proportion of deaths among COVID-19 confirmed cases has decreased to 3.4%.

### **Health concern**

The Philippines remains in Stage 2, localized community transmission, with data indicating an increasing trend and likely higher transmission in NCR and Central Visayas with evidence of cases exported from these Regions to other areas with lower levels of transmission.

The Inter-Agency Task Force for Emerging Infectious Diseases (IATF-EID) temporarily removed the “new normal” classification in its community quarantine phases, as high-risk areas will be placed either under an enhanced community quarantine (ECQ) or modified ECQ, while moderate-risk areas will be put under general community quarantine (GCQ) or the modified GCQ.

### **Livelihood Concern**

On June, the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) has signed a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) with the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas (BSP) for the digital disbursement of the second tranche of SAP. The DSWD and BSP emphasized that digital electronic disbursement is the most expedient way to accomplish this task. The agreement also specifies that the BSP shall provide assistance to the DSWD in technical discussions with financial service providers (FSPs) to ensure the effective implementation of account-based and digital/electronic disbursements

### **Education Concern**

To make sure that learning remains unhampered as the country battles the coronavirus pandemic, the DepEd will be implementing a distance learning approach when classes start on August 24 and is now preparing to shift to a distance learning mode. The enrollment for basic education for school year 2020-2021 is now being done remotely through phone or online platforms. The DepEd said students who cannot enroll using any remote method will be allowed in the last two weeks of June to physically register while observing physical distancing and health safety standards. Based on the DepEd's initial data, Calabarzon (Region IV-A) had the highest number of enrollees with 1,283,358, followed by Central Luzon (Region III) with 772,035. Metro Manila – the epicenter of coronavirus outbreak in the country – came in 3rd with 680,493 enrollees.

### **Challenge to distance learning mode:**

As of June 5, according to DEPED, there were already a total of 5,204,949 students in both public and private schools nationwide who have signed up during the first week of remote enrollment. This initial enrollees, however, is less than a fifth of last year's 27.7 million students.

Other concerns to be addressed include mass testing for education workers and the provision of laptops and internet allowance.

### ***Criticisms to August 2020 start of classes***

The decision to open schools in the middle of the health crisis was met with criticism from parents and students who pointed that finances of their households have been affected by quarantine policies. Some questioned the soundness of the policy as some households don't even have access to a computer or the internet. Meanwhile, senators on Monday afternoon unanimously approved on final reading a bill which seeks to give President Rodrigo Duterte the power to start classes later than August during a state of emergency. ### ***Concern for students with special needs***

Students with special needs will be included in preparations for the distance learning approach this coming school year but the adaptation of distance learning for special education may prove challenging. Even before the coronavirus pandemic, a 2019 study by state think tank Philippine Institute of Development Studies (PIDS) already revealed the challenges of the implementation of the special education curriculum in the Philippines.

The study cited a lot of barriers that hinder teachers from using inclusive strategies in the classroom, such as poor classroom management, inadequate use of materials, lack of instructional dialogue, and the teachers' lack of proficiency in sign language.
