Part 2: The Situation in Areas Where Educo/ChildFund Works

What issues are children, families and communities in these areas facing? (closed schools, home confinement, food shortages, safety concerns, health issues, etc.)

The National Government declared COVID-19 Alert System Code Red sublevel 2 (IATF Resolution No.11, series 2020) in response to the accelerating number of confirmed COVID-19 cases in the Philippines. The country is implementing the highest alert level as a response to the declaration of a public health emergency. The entire Metro Manila has been placed in locked down since 15 March 2020 and other areas in the country followed suit and issued community quarantine, including Cotabato, Iligan, Davao, Zamboanga Sibugay, Surigao cities, Lanao del Sur Province and Siargao and Bohol islands.

The Government Contingency Plan adopts a color-coded framework that provides an integrated and coordinated response for each specific stage: Code White, Blue and Red. Code Red is the alert level where Public Health Level Emergency is declared. The Department of Health (DOH) is the lead implementing agency of the COVID-19 Contingency Plan. The Plan provides for the establishment of 7 clusters that will implement the response strategies and activities: Health, Governance, Law and Order, Economy, Logistics, International Humanitarian Assistance and Risk Communication.

Last March 16, 2020, President Duterte placed the Philippines under a State of Calamity to enable the Government to respond to the rapidly spreading coronavirus disease. The State of Calamity is effective for 6 months unless the President lifts it sooner or extends its implementation.

In pursuant to Proclamation Number 929 and 922 series of 2020, the entire Island of Luzon (covering six regions and the National Capital Region) was placed on **Enhanced Community Quarantine and Stringent Social Distancing** measures from 17 March until 13 April 2020. The Proclamation declares the suspension of classes and all school activities in all levels until April 14, 2020; mass gatherings are prohibited; strict home quarantine shall be observed in all households; and movements are limited to accessing of basic necessities and provision of foods and essential health services. With this, heightened presence of uniformed personnel to enforce quarantine procedures is observed; and work from home arrangement shall be implemented in all government offices except those in the Philippine National police, Armed Forces of the Philippines, health and emergency frontline services, border control and other critical services. In addition, only those private establishments providing basic necessities shall be open, and such open establishments shall ensure the adoption of strict skeletal workforce to support operations and as well as social distancing measures. Mass public transport are also suspended, and land, sea and air travel are

restricted. The Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) and Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE) in coordination with Department of Finance, Department of Budget and Management, Department of Trade and Industry are in charge of formulating programs, projects and measures for the social amelioration of the affected workers and residents. The DSWD was further directed to institute measures to expedite the distribution of food assistance to the most affected population in the entire Luzon.

Province of Albay

In the Province of Albay where Educo Central Office is located, the provincial government immediately enacted the provincial ordinance adopting the Enhanced Community Quarantine and banned all community activities and mass gathering. Meanwhile, the City Government of Legazpi thru its Disaster Risk Reduction Committee and Climate Change Adoption and Management Council Advisory No. 008 series of 2020, ordered the suspension of all public and private offices, including malls. Private establishments were encouraged to continue operations and adapt work from home schemes. All those engaged in food services may continue its operations and Punong Barangays to come up with a plan to acquire foods and basic needs for their constituents, especially those who are self-quarantined due to illness or travels. As of 18 March 2020, the province of Albay issued E.O. 09 series of 2020 for the closure of all provincial borders.

In the areas covered by Project CFLG (Legazpi and Manito, Albay) all of the 38 partner barangays adhered to the provisions of City ordinance No. 15-0009-2020, which took effect last 15 March 2020. The said City Ordinance implemented the expanded coverage of the curfew as precautionary measures in times of epidemic and other national or city-wide health emergencies. The daily eight-hour curfew is to be implemented from 9pm to 4am. The Philippine National Police, barangay officials, barangay tanod (watchmen) and public safety officers will enforce the curfew and establish checkpoints in Legazpi City. All establishments operating in the city are encouraged to close business operations by 8 p.m. Those exempted from this order included the pharmaceutical stores, medical institutions, employees of national and local governments involved in Disaster Risk Reduction and Management, Emergency Quick Response Units, public utility companies involved in power generation and distribution, individuals engaged in meat, fish and vegetable businesses, and accredited media personnel. Violators who are residents of the city will be fined and sent home accompanied by village officials and police; non-resident violators will have their names listed for record purposes and will be asked to return to city of residence.

As of 19 March 2020, there are **zero** Person Under Investigation in all 38 project partner barangays, while **995** Persons Under Monitoring.

For Manito, Albay, the LGU implements the national EO for enhanced community quarantine. Curfew is also implemented from 8pm to 5am daily. Relief goods are being prepared to be distributed first to the front liners/ responders of the MLGU. From local sources (Barangay Chairman, Community Facilitators, Barangay Secretary and Councilors), there are **1** Persons Under Investigation and **142** Person Under Monitoring in the areas covered by the project.

For Albay Province, there is a total of **5 PUIs**, **14, 476 PUMs** and **zero confirmed case**, as of 18 March 2020.

Province of Camarines Sur

Six towns and a city in Camarines Sur have closed its borders and prohibited entry of non-residents to prevent the spread of coronavirus, effective last 18 March 2020. In Nabua and Bato (Educo areas), there are checkpoints to monitor all travelers to and from the municipalities. Only essential employees, to include health workers are allowed to pass through the borders. Cargoes with goods and necessities are also exempted. The Rural Health Unit leads the monitoring of all passengers passing through from the National Capital Region. Like other areas, Bato and Nabua municipalities passed municipal ordinances to implement preventive measures and to order purchase of supplies for COVID-19 response.

As of 18 March 2020, Province of Camarines Sur has **zero confirmed** case, **2 PUIs** and **24, 027 PUMs**.

Province of Sorsogon

The provincial government of Sorsogon released Executive Order (EO). No. 14 s. 2020 and declared the suspension of classes at all levels in public and private schools. E.O. No. 13 also mandated social distancing measures in relation to the management of COVID-19.

In the Municipality of Castilla, all classes in public and private schools are suspended under Municipal ordinance No. 01 s. 2020, starting 16 March 2020 until lifted. All of the Barangay Health Emergency Response Teams are also activated. With the passing of MDRRMC Advisory No. 02- 2020, as preventive and containment measure against the spread of COVID 19, the LGU strongly implements the use of alcohol/hand sanitizers, social distancing, and proper cough etiquette in all business establishments, public and private utility vehicles, and private and public offices. Likewise, the conduct of public gathering and events are prohibited. Resolution No. 003- 2020 also adopts the community quarantine policies and implements municipal curfew from 9pm to 4am. Check points along entry and exits points in the municipality are established.

In the Municipality of Donsol, MDRRM Council meeting convened to discuss the policies, strategies and action on how to combat the spread of COVID-19. There are ongoing check points on the borders of the municipality and curfew is also implemented.

For the Municipality of Pilar, a series of E.O.s were enacted to prevent and establish measures to contain and mitigate COVID-19 and the MLGU suspended all classes at all levels and all tourism activities.

For the Province of Sorsogon, as of 18 March 2020, there are **zero confirmed case** with **1 PUI** and **8, 318 PUMs**.

Province of Catanduanes

The provincial government of Catanduanes placed the province under a State of Calamity last 17 March 2020. The provincial, municipal, and barangay government units will prioritize relief good distribution to help poor families, especially tricycle drivers, farmers, laborers, fishermen and other ordinary workers who will suffer from loss of income due to the crisis. The province is also facing the problem of lack of personal protective equipment for the frontline health responders and personnel.

As of 18 March 2020, there are **zero confirmed case** of COVID-19 in Catanduanes with **zero PUI** and **3,440 PUMs**.

Zamboanga City

The City of Zamboanga will impose a total lockdown this coming March 20, 2020 at 1:00 am. Strict home quarantine will be imposed in all households, and movements of persons are limited to accessing necessities, with only two individuals per household allowed to leave the house. All establishments providing necessities will remain open, but classes and school activities are suspended. Gatherings like seminars, trainings, and celebrations remain to be suspended and city-wide curfew will be imposed from 9pm to 5am. All land, air, and sea travel will also be suspended. The movement of uniformed personnel, health front liners, those transporting medical supplies and specimens related to COVID-19, and provisions of humanitarian assistance are allowed. Likewise, strict implementation of *no spitting in public* as per Section 40 of City Ordinance No. 500, Sanitary Code of Zamboanga will be imposed. The Local Government Unit also activated the Barangay Health and Emergency Response Team in all barangays and designated the Lantaka Hotel as place of quarantine for any COVID-19 case. As of 18 March 2020, there are **zero** confirmed case, **199** PUMs and **11** PUMs in Zamboanga City.

The City Social Welfare and Development Office will be providing food packs, milk for children and vitamins to those affected by the lockdown. The Local Chief Executive assures the public that they have enough food and other goods prior to the lockdown of the city.

The Philippines -national status

As of 19 March 2020, there are **217** confirmed cases, **17** deaths and **8** recovered patients in the entire country. Out of the 17 deaths, 80% are male, and the majority are 60 years old and older. Ninety-three percent (93%) of deaths involved patients with one or more known ailments, to include diabetes, chronic kidney disease, and hypertension. Seventy-six (76) % of all cases are located in Metro Manila. Active contact tracing, case investigations, and identification of clusters of cases are ongoing.

Health Concern:

To date, no rapid testing kit for COVID-19 for in-country use has been certified by the WHO or by the DOH's Food and Drug Administration (FDA). This means possibly there may be more COVID-19 cases but cannot be confirmed due to lack of testing. Likewise, such persons are not receiving the necessary treatment they need and are unknowingly spreading the virus.

The Department of Health intensified its surveillance to actively look for clusters of cases of COVID-19 at the municipal, provincial, and regional levels. Meanwhile, the DOH will continue to conduct case investigations in close collaboration with the Local Government Units.

Despite the activation and deployment of the Barangay Health Emergency Response Teams and other health responders in the communities, not all are trained in handling the COVID-19 cases, and some do not have the proper protective equipment that is necessary to protect themselves from contracting the disease.

Social Protection Issues:

The majority of the affected persons are daily wage-earners. With the enhanced community quarantine, many of the business establishments temporarily closed, thus affecting the daily laborers, farmers, drivers, vendors, fishermen and other private employees. The government declared to provide the basic needs of the affected families, but there is uncertainty as to the extent of support and until when funding is available.

COVID-19-related movement restrictions are hindering many INGO and partners to access their areas of populations. WHO is advocating with DOH to provide INGO and partners movement so they could get access to communities for assessment and support, especially those organizations with ongoing humanitarian interventions.

Security and Safety:

Punong Barangay captains and the Barangay Defense Systems are expected to conduct checkpoints in their respective barangays. Children are not allowed to go out without a guardian as the community quarantine intensifies. In some of the areas, theft has been reported. There are also reported road accidents despite the quarantine and fewer cars and people on the roads.

Child protection risks caused or exacerbated by crisis (for example mental health problems/psychological distress, domestic violence, elder care, child labor, discrimination etc.)

Presently, there has been no reported child abuse case in the areas where Educo work. The strictly implemented community quarantine disrupts children's daily routine, such as going to school, playing outside the home, meeting with other children, etc. Such disruptions may cause anxiety or stress to children, especially if parents and caregivers have not explained to them what a pandemic is, and why they need to stay at home. Children and families who are already vulnerable due to socio-economic reasons or those living in overcrowded settings are particularly impacted by the lockdown as family income decreases and social distancing measures difficult to implement. If children experience illness or death in the family and/or separated from loved ones during the quarantine, they may suffer from trauma and psychological distress. Social stigmatization of infected children or family members may also pose protection concerns as they may be subjected to discrimination and bullying

The disruption to livelihood and to family routines may also lead to increased domestic violence and child abuse with adults experiencing added stress and pressures from the situation. Children in the streets and children working in the streets are exposed to risks as they lack access to protective services, food, shelter, and health support during this crisis.

How many of our beneficiaries and families are affected?

Educo Philippines operates in the Bicol Region and in the Zamboanga Peninsula. These two regions are affected by the Enhanced Community Quarantine and localized lock down measures implemented by the national and local government unit. Such measures were implemented in response to the public health emergency caused by COVID-19. In the Bicol Region, the **122 Educo covered schools** were closed, affecting **13, 843 active children** and **173 partner communities**. In Zamboanga City, **16,282** direct beneficiaries (**8,581 children, 7,701 adults**) and **154,450** indirect beneficiaries have been affected. The organization has no record of the exact number of children and families who have become ill due to COVID 19, as monitoring is difficult due to the limited movement of staff and partners.

Planned and Desired Response:

Risk Communication and Community Engagement:

1. Design COVID-19 information and communication materials in an inclusive and child-friendly manner intended for children (including children with disabilities and ECCD-aged children) youth and adolescents, women (including pregnant and lactating), elderlies and frontline workers.
2. Printing and dissemination of COVID-19 IEC Materials to partner communities and even outside Educo's coverage in partnership with NGA's and LGU's.
3. Dissemination of IEC Materials on online platform.
4. Develop feedback mechanism to adapt messages in the evolving situation.

Education in Emergencies:

1. Support disinfection of schools and provision of hygiene kits for school children thru Brigada Eskwela.
2. Reorientation of WASH in school program (Conduct WASH in school reorientation to school children upon the resumption of classes.
3. Establishment of handwashing facilities (can utilize improvise and low-cost materials) in schools and partner communities thru cash voucher programming.
4. Conduct of psychosocial session to school children upon resumption of classes.
5. Develop sessions guides for FLO/ADMs/ ALS integrating COVID-19 education and awareness raising for continued education.
6. Maximize the use of technology- emails, group chat, FB, twitter and the likes to coordinate with the Region, Divisions and school levels. We need to know their plans for the next SY 2020 -2021
7. Contingency plans of each school or district to include COVID-19 may be reviewed with the technical assistance of Educo.
8. Establish effective relationship/rapport with all PSDSs in our area of influence particularly to influence them on the nature of Education in Emergency. As social distancing is a necessity, it is the technology now that plays a vital role.
9. All PCs must start establishing a Group Chat with their respective education personnel.

Child Protection and Gender-Based Violence in Emergencies:

1. Conduct/support child safeguarding and GBV risk mitigation, PSEA and safe referral practices orientation to health workers, educators, and other frontline workers.

2. Establish safe, child friendly complaints and feedback mechanism in health care facilities and communities.
3. Development and roll-out of child-friendly complaints and feedback mechanisms regarding COVID19 response in schools and other education facilities.
4. Train teachers and other school staff on signs of distress for them to be able to identify and refer children who may have been affected by the ECQ and/or experienced any form of violence or abuse.
5. Integration of MHPSS to identified project activities to address the stigma and psychosocial effect of COVID-19 to affected population/ communities

ECCD in Emergencies:

1. Development of ECCD session plans that discuss about COVID-19 orientation and prevention with younger children.
2. Establishment of handwashing facilities in ECCD Centers and SNP sites thru cash voucher programming.
3. Development of PES, WASH and Nutrition session guides that includes for parents of ECCD-aged children including pregnant and lactating women

Partnership and Coordination:

1. Strong coordination and collaboration with partner agencies like Department of Health, OCD, DSWD, CRN and Joining Forces.
2. Support partner communities in enhancing Contingency Plans and/or response for COVID-19.
3. Provision of tents to partner agencies/ communities in need of temporary spaces/tents that will serve as health stations other COVID-19 related response.
4. Provision of educational materials, art materials, toys to children under quarantine.
5. Provision of IEC materials on prevention of COVID19, mental health and best parenting techniques, especially under the circumstances of parents working from home and children staying indoors due to the enhanced community quarantine.
6. Provision of PPE materials to frontline health workers.
